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FOREWORD

By careful examination of old records and by evaluation of material gathered from many different sources, we have compiled a genealogy, which we believe is fairly accurate. Our early pioneer forefathers left few written records of their achievements. Their wills and last testaments in many cases were the only means of revealing to us their extensive family groups. Very often these records were stored away in the family attic and never read until "rediscovered" at the request of the family historian. Many such records, I am certain, have not as yet been found. Let me urge that all of us who may have such valuable documents in their possession, present them at one of our annual reunions.

Both the Speicher and the Spyker families can regard Berks County, Pennsylvania, as their ancestral home. The spelling of Speicher was changed to Spicher by some members of the family who moved to Central Pennsylvania and farther west. John Spyker, Sr., together with his sons, John, Jr., Peter, and Benjamin, arrived at Philadelphia on September 4, 1737 aboard the ship, St. Andrew, and subsequently settled in western Berks County. Ulrich Speicher, together with his sons, Michael and Peter, and, of course, other members of their families, whose names were not listed in the ship's register, arrived at Philadelphia on October 8, 1737 aboard the ship, Charming Nancy. Thus we see that both families arrived in America at about the same time. Ulrich and his family also settled in western Berks.

It has been a pleasure to trace the lineage of our family and in a sense meet our early forebears. They were pioneers in the true sense of the word. Lacking the means and privileges of an academic training, they were educated in the backwoods environment of their time. They came to Pennsylvania seeking religious, political, and economic freedom. They cleared the forest, cultivated the soil, built homes and churches and finally helped to establish a commonwealth of which we can all be proud. They came not for gold, but for freedom. In the words of the poet:

Not as the conqueror comes

They, the true-hearted came

Not with the roll of stirring drums

And the trumpet that sings of fame.

Amid the storm they sang
And the stars heard and the sea,
And the sounding aisles of the dim wood rang
To the anthem of the free.

What sought they thus afar?

Bright jewels of the mine?

The wealth of seas, the spoils of war?

They sought a faith's pure shrine.

This history could not have been written in its present form without the early efforts of the former Secretary of the Family Reunion, Miss Susan Spicher. Through these efforts, and by her cordial greetings at family gatherings, she won the good will of the entire "freundschaft." We remember her as a friendly and sincere person, who during the greater part of her life labored under severe adversities, yet never failed to bear true Christian witness.

We also wish to express our sincere gratitude to Mr. Craig R. Spicher of Donners Grove, Illinois, for his interest in the family group by printing the family coat-of-arms. A replica of the coat-of-arms appears on the cover of this book. Every family related to the Speichers is entitled to a copy. To obtain your copy be sure to attend the annual reunion, which is always held on the second Saturday in August. This year (1961) it will be held at the North Heidelberg Church which is located between Robesonia and Bernville, Pennsylvania.

Finally, I wish to acknowledge the help and encouragement of Uncle Jacob of New Castle, Delaware, who has always been ready to assist in the publication of this history in every way possible.

WILLIAM PENN, OUR BENEFACTOR

No history of the Speicher family or any other family of the Pennsylvania German origin would be complete without a tribute to its great benefactor, William Penn. At this point, let us recall how the countries of central Europe were devastated by the religious wars of the 16th and 17th centuries. By the close of the latter century, much of the wealth of Germany had been destroyed, its farming land made barren and its population terribly reduced.

At this critical time, William Penn visited the Rhineland provinces of Germany to secure settlers for his newly organized province of Pennsylvania. As a Quaker, he spoke to them of the doctrine of freedom of worship and the love of his fellowmen. He also spoke of fertile lands, abundance of game, and great forests where they could begin life anew with the blessings of a Provident Creator. The first group to respond to Penn's invitation was a group of Mennonites led by Francis Pastorius. They purchased land from Penn and arrived in Philadelphia in the October of 1683. In a few years they laid out the part of Philadelphia we now know as Germantown. They were farmers, weavers and manufacturers. Within a few years, their settlement was prosperous and the people were happy and contented.

Some years later a group of Palatinate Germans, who had first settled in New York State, floated their few worldly possessions down the Susquehanna River on rafts as far as Middletown. From there they moved up the Swatara Creek and finally reached western Berks County. Conrad Weiser was one of these early settlers. After 1710, nearly all the German immigrants entered Pennsylvania through the port of Philadelphia. Ulrich Speicher, our forefather, arrived in Philadelphia on the *Charming Nancy* in 1737.

William Penn, our great benefactor, was born in 1644. His father was an Admiral in the British Navy and his mother was of Dutch descent. His father had hoped that he would follow his own naval career. Early in life he came under the influence of the teachings of George Fox, the founder of the Society of Friends, more often called the Quakers. For this belief and practice he suffered many hardships. While William was still a young man, his father ordered him from home for remaining true to the new creed. After the death of his father, King Charles II offered him a grant of land in America in payment of a large debt that the King owed the elder Penn. The tract of land lav west of the Delaware River, its northern boundary was the 43 parallel of latitude. The southern boundary was uncertain for some years, but was finally fixed at latitude 39°40' and became historically famous as the Mason and Dixon line. The boundary between Pennsylvania and Delaware was established as the arc of a circle with a radius of twelve miles, with New Castle, Delaware, as its center.

During colonial times the province of Pennsylvania and the province of Delaware had the same governor, but each had its own assembly. William Penn obtained the latter by purchase from the Duke of York. As a result, the earliest history of the two provinces are closely associated with the life of the Proprietor. Penn made his first trip to his provinces in 1782 on the ship *Welcome*. He first landed on American soil at New Castle, Delaware, on October 27, 1682. A few days later he met delegates at Chester, Pennsylvania, for the purpose of establishing a permanent government for the two provinces. Significantly, the "Great Law" established freedom of religion as its first provision.

Penn remained in the province for two years and then urgent problems made his return to England necessary. Fifteen years elapsed before he could return. He again remained two years, sailing for home in 1701. He lived for 7 more years after his return, but they were years of heartache and tragedy. At one time he served nine months in a debtors' prison. In desperation he tried to resell his holdings in America to the king. Before the transaction could be completed, he died in 1718.

While his last years were tragic, his noble experiment took root and has been a haven for the oppressed for many decades. We, the descendants of those earlier pioneers, who heard the welcome invitation of William Penn to come to Pennsylvania, shall honor and revere him as long as we live in the "land of the free and the home of the brave."

THE SPYKERS OF THE TULPEHOCKEN AND LEWISBURG

Peter Spyker arriver in America aboard the ship St. Andrews in 1737, accompanied by his parents and several brothers and sisters. Upon their arrival in Philadelphia, his father John, Sr., his brother, John, Jr., and Peter took the oath of allegiance. His brother Benjamin was under age, therefore could not be "qualified."

The Spykers, upon their arrival, settled in Western Berks County. From the fact that they were neighbors to many German settlers who had come to the Tulpehocken section by way of Schoharie, New York, it was supposed by some historians that they too had come by that route. This supposition, however, is not correct.

Soon after their arrival in America, both Peter and his brother Benjamin became leaders in the civic affairs of the colony. Benjamin was closely associated with Conrad Weiser in the defense of the Tulpehocken region during the French and Indian Wars. At the beginning of the Revolutionary War he helped to organize and train troops for active military duties. He represented Berks County in the Provincial Conference in 1776. He served as a Justice of the Peace for many years. He died in 1802. Peter also served as Justice of the Peace until his appointment as Judge of the County in 1763. As a reward for faithful service, he was appointed President Judge in 1780. He held this office until this death in 1789.

Perhaps the best known member of the Spyker family was Colonel Henry Spyker. He was a son of Judge Peter Spyker. He was in his early twenties when the Revolutionary War began. At the early age of 23 years he was appointed adjutant of a regiment in the Pennsylvania Militia. While on active duty he was appointed Colonel of the 6th Battalion.

On August 26, 1777, he was commissioned paymaster of the Berks County Militia, a position which he occupied until July 27, 1785. During this time he distributed the vast sum of £122,147 7S 6d and accounted satisfactorily for every penny. Often amid the clamoring of the poorly paid troops, he was compelled to exhaust every means of securing the necessary funds. After the war he served in the Legislature of his adopted State from 1784 to 1790.

In 1795 he erected the first brick house in Lewisburg, Union County, Pa. It is still standing at the corner of St. Catharine and Front Streets. After disposing of this mercantile business and other holdings, Colonel Henry moved to Lewisburg where he resumed his interests in business and civic affairs. He died July 1, 1817. His wife, Maria Weiser Spyker, died October 11, 1829. Both are buried in Lewisburg Cemetery.



ULRICH SPEICHER

Ulrich Speicher arrived at Philadelphia on October 8, 1737, aboard the ship *Charming Nancy*. To the best of our knowledge, he was very poor and possibly became a bound servant to pay for his passage and for the passage of his family. In 1755, eighteen years after his arrival in Pennsylvania, Ulrich received a grant of land from the Proprietors. In the records of the Land Office at Harrisburg is the following entry:

"By virtue of a warrant dated the 8th day of June, 1755, to Ulrich Speiker, the above described tract of land situated in Bearn Township, Berks County, containing 193½ acres of land with allowance of 6 per cent.

Signed John Scull."

Later this same tract was patented to Emmanuel Schlappich on August 29, 1870.

Ulrich had at least two sons of whom we have a record—Peter and Michael. Ulrich sold his property to his son Michael. The following deed is recorded in the Courthouse at Reading, Pennsylvania. It is the oldest document of the family history that we have found.

PURCHASE OF LAND AGREEMENT BETWEEN ULRICH SPEICHER AND HIS SON, MICHAEL SPEICHER

DATED APRIL 8, 1762

"KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS, that I, Ulrich Speiger of Barn Township in the County of Berks and province of Pensilvania yeoman for and in consideration of the sum of one hundred pounds lawfull money of Pensilvania to me in hand paid or condition'd to be paid by Michael Speiger of the same place, HAVE granted bargained and sold unto the said Michael Speiger my improvement, lying and being in the said Township of Barn, adjoyning on the lands of Christel Hirtzberger, Adam Grim, and Valentine Himmelberger, containing about two hundred acres of land being the same more or less, whereof I do acknowledge the receipt and myself therewith fully and entirely satisfied, HAVE granted bargained sold set over and delivered, and by these presents, DO grant bargain sell set over and deliver unto the said Michael Speiger all my right and property to the said Improvement as above mentioned, together also with all and singular the buildings rights members improvements heredities and appurtenances whatsoever thereunto belonging and the reversions and remainders thereof - -


"TO HAVE AND TO HOLD THE said bargained premises unto him the said Michael Speiger or his heirs and assigns to the only

proper use and behoof of him the said Michael Speiger or his heirs and assigns forever. AND I the said Ulrich Speiger for my self and my heirs executors and administrators (But reserving for my self the said Ulrich Speiger to live on the said bargained premises my natural life.) The said bargained premises unto him the said Michael Speiger or his heirs and assigns, against all an all manner of person or persons from or under me, or by me in any case shall and will for ever warrant and defend, THE HON.ble PROPRIETORS OR LORDS OF THE TILL'S always excepted, by these presents

"IN WITNESS WHEREOF I the said Ulrich Speiger have hereunto set my hand and seal, dated the eighth day of Aprill Anno Domini One Thousand seven hundred and sixty two - - -

SEALED AND DELIVER'D in the presence of us

MICHAEL SPEICHER

Undoubtedly Michael lived at the old homestead all his life. He had a family of seven children. We have information of each one except Anna and Michael. About the year 1800, a Michael Speicher moved into Somerset County, Pennsylvania. Some records state that he came from Berks County. If he did—and there are good reasons to think so—it reveals to us the relationship of a large family of Speichers in Somerset and adjoining counties to their kinsmen in Berks. The spirit of moving West was beginning to make men anxious

to find a still better home and greater opportunities. About this time John Peter moved to Juniata County and from there his descendants have gone to every part of the United States. Jacob died in 1823 and Christian lived at the old home. He died about 1850. Barbara was never married. She kept house for her father until his death and later for her brother Jacob. We have no record of Magdalena, although we do know that she did not marry.

WILL OF MICHAEL SPEICHER

DATED JUNE 18, 1800 (Translated from German)

In the name of God, amen. I, Michael Speicher, the elder, of the Township of Bern in the County of Berks and state of Pennsylvania, being aged and at present, thanks be to God, of good and sound memory and understanding, but having considered the mortality of man, I make herewith my last will and testament and dispose of my

worldly estate in the following manner (that is to say).

My will is that after my decease my body shall be interred in a Christian-like manner and that my just debts be paid, then my will is and I do hereby give and bequeath unto my beloved son, Christian Speicher, all my land and plantation and several tracts of land adjoining each other in Bern Township aforesaid. It being the same whereon I now dwell, being the same now in his possession to hold to him the said Christian Speicher, his heirs and assigns forever. For which land or plantation my said son, Christian Speicher, shall pay the sum of six hundred pounds in good lawful gold or silver money of Pennsylvania in the following manner and to the respective persons hereafter mentioned. First he, my said son, Christian, shall pay one year after decease the sum of one hundred pounds which shall be paid in equal shares to my respective children; namely, to Barbara, Jacob, Anna, Michael, John Peter, and Magdalena. Then, after the first payment shall be paid in yearly payments to the same, the sum of thirty-three pounds and six shillings and eight pence beginning at the oldest; namely Barbara, and ending at Magdalena (always excluding my son Christian of the payment aforesaid) until the whole of said six hundred pounds are paid off in equal shares. Then further, it is my will that soon after my decease, all my moveables shall be sold by public sale by my executors hereafter nominated and mentioned and the money therefrom arising together with my outstanding debts in bonds, notes and book debts shall be equally divided in equal shares among all my children except thirty pounds which shall first be taken off by my daughter Barbara for her use.

Then further it is my will that if I should not confirm the said land or plantation by a deed (in my lifetime) to my said son, Christian Speicher, then it it my will that the same shall be confirmed to him in fee simple by my said executor or one of them or the survivors or the

survivor of them or him. And lastly I do hereby nominated and constitute my beloved son Christian Speicher and my trustworthy brother Peter Speicher or the survivors or survivor of them to be executors of this my last will and testament and do hereby empower them or the survivors or survivor of them to do all such which as executors it is necessary for them to do. And I do hereby revoke and make void all former and other wills and testaments. In witness and confirmation of this my last will and testament, I have herewith set my hand and seal this 18th day of June in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred.

JACOB SPEICHER (?-1823)

Jacob, son of Michael, lived on a farm in Upper Bern Township. He had two children, Suzanna and Jacob. His wife died in 1811. After the death of his wife, his sister Barbara kept house for him until his death. We assume that Jacob's daugther Suzanna lived with him until her marriage to John Miller. There is evidence that the Millers may have joined the emigrants to Juniata County. After the death of his mother, the son, Jacob, moved to Lancaster County to live with his maternal grandfather. He married Leah Stoltzfus, and their descendants constitute the Lancaster County group of the Speicher family.

WILL OF JACOB SPEICHER DATED MARCH 9, 1822

(Translated from German)

I, the undersigned, Jacob Speicher, from Upper Bern Township, Berks County, state of Pennsylvania, I who am weak in body and feeble, but have my full understanding and sound mind and memory, and have the power to make decisions; I possess my mental faculties like my healthy years, for which I thank God heartily, and believing that all must die, make and declare this document my last will and testament, namely, first I recommend my soul to the hand of my Lord for His eternal mercy and my body to the earth, which my executors shall bury me in a Christian manner and so shall find it good.

My worldly possessions, which consist of a farm in Upper Bern Township which contains twenty-one acres, more or less, and different things, also set my will that my farm shall be operated by the executors, which I hereby appoint until my son Jacob shall become twentyone years of age. After that, my son and my daughter, Susanna, will select three honest neighbors and these neighbors shall appraise this land or obligations of its value, and then my son shall pay half to my daughter. In case Susanna will not accept this appraisement in this manner, my daughter shall buy the farm and pay half to my son. In case none of the children can accept, the executors must sell my property and divide it equally. Further, it is my will that my personal property shall be sold at public sale, except my books which shall be given by my executors to my children. My clothing shall be given to my son and the clothing of my wife, who died previously, shall be given to my daughter. And my son shall have a list. The articles in the drawers shall not be sold. To my sister Barbara I give twenty-five pounds, for services she rendered many years.

And finally I name my brother, Christian Speicher, and my brother-in-law, John Renno, as the executors of this my last will and

testament, and I give the power to said Christian Speicher and John Renno at the same time to be legal guardians to take care of the fortunes and persons of my two children. If one should die, the other shall take over the responsibility and in case both die, the Orphans Court shall name another executor.

And I declare once more that this covanent to which I have added ed my signature will be my last will and testament, and I have added this seal to confirm it as necessary. This document is executed in Upper Bern Township on the ninth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and twenty-two and undersigned and sealed and declared as my last will and testament.

JOHN PETER SPEICHER (1773-1826)

John Peter Speicher moved to Juniata County soon after the close of the Revolutionary War. His family was one of about ten families which left Berks County at that time to migrate westward with the hope of finding a new home and new opportunities. Stephan Kauffman and his family were in this group of emigrants, but soon returned to Berks County. Names of other families that migrated are: Kauffman, Maust, Miller, Sieber, and Renno.

John settled near Thompsontown where he raised a family of 13 children. After his death the children changed the spelling of Speicher to "Spicher." He died in 1826 at the age of 53 years. His widow Magdalene survived him by almost 40 years. Both are buried in the Lost Creek Mennonite Cemetery at Oakland Mills.

CHRISTIAN SPEICHER

Christian was one of the sons of Michael Speicher. We do not know the year of his birth nor the year of his death, but believe that he died about the year 1850. With his uncle, Peter, he was named co-executor of his father's will. Later he was named co-executor of his brother Jacob's will. Before Jacob's will could be fully executed, Mr. Renno, the other co-executor, died, so that the final disposition of the estate was made by Christian. We believe he spent his entire life at the old homestead in Bern Township. He was perhaps the last of the family to be buried on the family plot. The title of the farm passed from the Speicher family in 1870.

Christian was the father of six children: Henry, John, Catharine, Sarah, Anna and Jacob. Three Speicher children married three Bellman children. Henry married Sallie Bellman, the daughter of Jonas Bellman. They had eight children. The mother died when the youngest son, Henry, was an infant.

John married Catharine Bellman. Soon after their marriage, they moved to Lebanon County. They reared a large family. Many of their descendants still live in Lebanon County. One of the children was Mrs. Amanda Schott who helped promote the Speicher Reunion in its early years.

Catharine, the oldest daughter of Christian, married Jonas Bellman. We know of only two children of this family: Elias and Saul. No record is available of any grandchildren.

Sarah married Stephan Kauffman. As previously mentioned, they joined the emigrants to Juniata County, but returned shortly thereafter. The Kauffmans had only one daughter, Zeriah. She married William Zerby.

Anna, the youngest of the daughters, married Jonas Kreitz. They reared a large family and many of their descendants still live in their native county of Berks.

Jacob, the last named of the children of Christian, was not necessarily the youngest. He was named executor of his father's will. During the process of executing the will, the ancestral home was sold (1870) to Emmanuel Schlappich. Shortly afterwards he bought a farm in North Heidelberg Township. Jacob had two sons, Henry and Jacob. The former married Sara Marks and the latter, Themson Roether. Henry had two daughters, but only one grew to maturity.

Jacob, the other son, had a family of eight children. He first lived on a farm near Robesonia, Pennsylvania, but later bought a farm in North Heidelberg, where he lived until 1895. During that year he retired and moved to Robesonia where he lived until his death in 1927. The names of his children are: Matthias, Lillie, Charles, Allison, Anna, Ella, Themson and Jacob. The last named Jacob has lived in New Castle, Delaware, for the past 50 years.



PETER SPEICHER

Peter was one of the two sons of Ulrich Speicher. The descendants of both brothers are quite numerous in Berks County, while many others have moved to different counties of Pennsylvania and to other states of the Union. Many still live in the vicinity of the old Speicher homestead. Both brothers were born in the old country and must have been quite young on their arrival at Philadelphia.

Peter was named an executor of the will of his brother, Michael. We have no record of his children. We are reasonably sure, however, that the Christian named in the following genealogy was his grandson. The evidence, however, is verbal, but reliable. My uncle, Charles G. Speicher, stated at different times that his grandfather and the grandfather of Isaac Speicher were second cousins.

A study of the genealogy of Peter and Michael will confirm this fact and thus definitely establish Christian as a grandson of Peter.





Dr. Speicher spoke of barriers that have been broken down which have made it possible for the world to become a neighborhood. So many groups have made up our national life. The finest things of each group should be translated into our economic life. Each should strive to retain the most splendid things characteristic of the group. Lack of proper distribution is the cause of much of our unhappiness and not lack of production.

We may be united physically but not spiritually or economically. Christianity can unite us in these two fields.

She spoke of having located some papers which might help establish some facts about the early Speichers, but they are in German script and will need a reader of German script to be of value. Also the names and addresses of 6 members of the clan who are in army camps were reported.

A brief report on the quilt for Craig Spichers was given by Mrs. Paul I. Speicher.

We feel that special mention should be given concerning the grandchildren of Daniel Spicher of Thompsontown. All east of the Mississippi were present.
